Main Character Arcs

Character development analysis based on the 7 September 2026 screenplay draft

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1. Overview of the Character Architecture

Triumvirate 3 uses an ensemble structure in which faith, grief and responsibility expose each character's deepest values. Hamidi Abdullahi, Meti Gebre and Hart Chepere form the principal dramatic triangle: Hamidi represents service without domination, Meti represents inherited responsibility and renewal, while Hart turns belief into spectacle, grievance and war. Cerberus sits behind Hart as the older corrupting force. Cathleen, Daniel, Liya and the intelligence characters ground that spiritual conflict in family, evidence, institutions and ordinary human choice.

The central dramatic contrast is between faith as service and faith as possession. Hart offers certainty, belonging, spectacle and an enemy to blame. Hamidi offers responsibility, sacrifice and a refusal to claim any one belief system as his own. Meti inherits that second path, but unlike Hamidi she must learn it through grief, adolescence and the knowledge that the cycle will continue.

2. Hamidi Abdullahi

Hamidi follows a steadfast positive arc that reaches sacrificial completion. His moral position does not change: he remains committed to balance, service and resistance to demonic manipulation. What changes is the emotional meaning of that commitment. By the end, he no longer simply risks himself for the mission; he accepts death as the price of protecting Meti, humanity and the wider order represented by the Guardians.

Hamidi's final victory comes not from overpowering Cerberus, but from accepting mortality within a life he knows to be cyclical. His calm acceptance — 'I am at peace, my Lord' — completes the trilogy's movement from supernatural power toward moral responsibility.

Starting State

- Hamidi is already an experienced Re-inc, spiritually disciplined and accustomed to confronting demonic forces.
- He has been reunited with Liya and Meti, giving him a family life that the previous conflicts rarely allowed.
- He remains protective of Meti and initially tells her it is too soon for her to join the pursuit.
- His calm certainty hides the cumulative grief of countless remembered lives.

Driving Want and Inner Test

External want: Identify the force behind the attacks on sacred sites, stop Hart from provoking a global Holy War, and return Cerberus to confinement.

Internal need: Accept that Meti is no longer simply someone to protect; she is a fellow Re-inc whose choices and powers must be trusted.

Core belief: Power exists to serve life, not to possess, dominate or divide it.

Personal wound: Hamidi carries the accumulated losses of many lives, intensified here by Liya's murder and the knowledge that Meti must endure the same endless cycle.

Major Stages of the Arc

1. Peace interrupted

In Jerusalem, Hamidi is briefly surrounded by family rather than crisis. His conversation with Liya about Meti establishes both parental pride and anxiety: their daughter remembers earlier lives and her abilities are already emerging.

2. The return of Cerberus

The Western Wall attack and Hamidi's meditation reveal that Cerberus or one of his agents is active. He can sense a desert and Rome, but not the full design. For once, his supernatural perception is incomplete, forcing investigation rather than certainty.

3. Partnership under pressure

Cathleen accompanies him through Rome and Paris as they are hunted by conventional authorities. Their banter and mutual reliance show that the partnership established in the first two films is now fully operational rather than tentative.

4. The Re-inc truth spoken

On the train, Cathleen finally demands an explanation. Hamidi reveals that he and Meti are Re-incs: they do not age normally, heal quickly, possess unnatural powers and return in new bodies after death. The mythology becomes emotionally meaningful rather than merely mysterious.

5. Failure to save everyone

At Notre Dame, Cathleen challenges Hamidi over his refusal to use his powers to save individual victims. His answer — that this is not why he is there — exposes the harsh discipline of his role and the moral tension between global mission and immediate compassion.

6. Liya's death

Hamidi returns to Winston's house to find Liya murdered. His power cannot reverse the loss. The scene strips away the distance of the supernatural protector and leaves a husband and father apologising to his grieving daughter.

7. Teaching Meti what forever costs

Hamidi and Meti discuss the Re-inc cycle as a poisoned chalice. He reminds her of earlier motherhood and promises another life, but her pain makes clear that recurrence does not erase grief. His role shifts from protector to teacher of endurance.

8. Exposing Hart rather than simply killing him

At Allegiant Stadium, Hamidi uses Hart's own platform against him. He publicly names him as the warmonger, proves ordinary bullets cannot kill him and forces the demon to reveal himself before a global audience. Truth is made public before force is used.

9. The final act of service

At Harrisburg, Hamidi recognises Cerberus, protects the others, separates himself from Meti and enters the demon's field. The bolas fail, so he places the iron collar himself. Cerberus takes his heart, but the collar becomes the cage that removes the demon. Hamidi dies having chosen the cost.

Arc Resolution

Hamidi's body dies, but the Re-inc mythology prevents the ending from becoming annihilation. Fifteen years later Meti's newborn son Hamilton is presented as Hamidi returned. The relationship has reversed: the father who once protected and taught Meti has become the child she must protect and teach. His arc therefore closes personally while continuing cosmologically.

3. Cathleen Henshaw

Cathleen follows a steadfast commitment arc. Her conversion from sceptic to believer happened earlier in the trilogy; Triumvirate 3 tests what that commitment now costs. She remains the practical, human counterweight to Hamidi's spiritual world, but by the end she is no longer merely his ally. She is part of the family that survives him.

Cathleen's development is not toward greater belief, but toward deeper belonging. She begins as Hamidi's fugitive partner and ends fifteen years later as Meti's trusted godmother and enduring connection to the life Hamidi left behind.

Starting State

- Cathleen already accepts Hamidi's supernatural mission and travels with him without needing proof of every new event.
- She remains blunt, practical and sceptical of mystical evasiveness, especially about Hamidi's true nature.
- Her bond with Meti is affectionate and increasingly familial.
- She is still a wanted ex-FBI agent, so institutional authority remains both a resource and a threat.

Driving Want and Inner Test

External want: Help Hamidi identify and stop the force behind the attacks while keeping the group alive and ahead of international law enforcement.

Internal need: Accept that she cannot control every loss, while still choosing action and human attachment over emotional retreat.

Core belief: Evidence matters, but once truth is known, responsibility requires action.

Personal wound: The trilogy has stripped away her institutional certainty and repeatedly killed allies; Triumvirate 3 tests whether she can remain open to family despite that cost.

Major Stages of the Arc

1. A surrogate bond with Meti

In Jerusalem, Cathleen and Meti compare absent fathers and recognise similarities. The exchange quietly establishes a relationship that will outlive Hamidi and Liya.

2. Demanding the truth from Hamidi

On the train, Cathleen refuses another evasive answer and makes Hamidi explain what an Angel and Re-inc actually are. Her scepticism now works inside belief: she accepts the impossible but still demands clarity.

3. Human morality challenges cosmic duty

At Notre Dame, Cathleen asks why Hamidi cannot save even one person. She refuses to let global purpose become an excuse for emotional distance, keeping the supernatural mission connected to individual human life.

4. The family is attacked

At Winston's house, Cathleen recognises Sam among the dead and helps absorb the practical aftermath while Meti and Hamidi grieve Liya. Her role becomes both operational and protective.

5. She finds the route forward

The Furnace Creek newspaper story gives Cathleen the practical link between the murdered rangers, the vanished girl and Hart's sudden appearance in Las Vegas. The grounded investigator helps convert supernatural uncertainty into a destination.

6. Public action at Allegiant Stadium

Cathleen uses her FBI identity even though she is wanted, fires the ordinary rounds that prove Hart is not human, then uses mercury ammunition to deliver the killing blow while Meti restrains him. She remains the trilogy's human action figure inside a supernatural solution.

7. Witness to Hamidi's sacrifice

At Harrisburg, Cathleen cannot prevent Hamidi from separating himself and confronting Cerberus. She reaches him only after the cage has taken Cerberus and has to tell Meti, simply, that her father is gone.

8. The surviving family

At the Ethiopian graves, Cathleen stands beside Meti as both parents are buried. Fifteen years later she arrives at the New York hospital carrying flowers, showing that her connection to Meti has become permanent family rather than temporary mission.

Arc Resolution

Cathleen ends as the trilogy's human continuity figure. Hamidi dies and Meti moves into adulthood, but Cathleen remains present. Her role in a future continuation is therefore potentially crucial: she remembers the earlier Hamidi, understands the supernatural war, and is emotionally tied to both Meti and the reborn Hamilton.

4. Meti Gebre

Meti has the screenplay's strongest developmental arc. She begins as Hamidi and Liya's twelve-year-old daughter — already ancient in memory but still socially and emotionally a child — and ends as the next-generation protagonist. The story moves her from protected Re-inc to active combatant, bereaved daughter, inheritor of Hamidi's mission and finally mother to his next incarnation.

Meti's defining paradox is that she is simultaneously a child and someone who remembers adulthood, motherhood and previous lives. Triumvirate 3 turns that paradox into the emotional engine of succession.

Starting State

- Meti is physically twelve but remembers earlier lives with unusual clarity.
- Her powers are developing rapidly, but Hamidi still treats her as someone who should remain behind.
- She is playful and contemporary despite her ancient memories, preserving an ordinary-child voice inside the mythology.
- She is deeply attached to both parents and has not yet experienced this incarnation's defining bereavement.

Driving Want and Inner Test

External want: Protect her family and help stop Cerberus and Hart as her abilities become necessary to the mission.

Internal need: Accept that being a Re-inc does not spare her from grief, and that adulthood means choosing what to do with inherited power rather than simply possessing it.

Core belief: Family and connection remain meaningful even when lives repeat.

Personal wound: Liya and Hamidi both die during the story, leaving Meti to continue without either parent in their current forms.

Major Stages of the Arc

1. Childhood with ancient memory

Meti jokes about clothes bought online and tells Cathleen she witnessed the Western Wall's construction. The juxtaposition establishes her unique identity: ordinary adolescent behaviour coexists with memories no child should possess.

2. The protected daughter resists

When Hamidi orders her to remain in Jerusalem, Meti argues that she can help. His refusal sets up the central generational tension: Hamidi sees danger; Meti sees readiness.

3. Independent use of power

Meti gets herself and Liya through Ben Gurion Airport by making blank papers appear valid and persuading staff to perceive them as employees. Her abilities are no longer accidental; she plans and controls them.

4. Power becomes survival

Noan murders Sam and Liya, then reveals his demonic form. Meti responds alone, hurling him through the kitchen, pinning him with knives and finally killing him with invisible force. The protected child becomes the person who defeats the threat.

5. Grief changes the mythology

Meti asks Hamidi when the pain will end. Their conversation reveals that every new life adds losses to previous ones. Her immortality becomes an emotional burden rather than a fantasy of endless survival.

6. She accepts the mission

Meti leaves Winston with Hamidi and Cathleen and participates fully in the Las Vegas operation. The farewell — Winston telling her to look after them and Meti answering “Yes, sir” — quietly reverses her earlier protected status.

7. Equal participant at the stadium

Meti uses her powers to restrain Hart while Cathleen fires the mercury rounds. Her intervention is essential: Hamidi exposes Hart, Cathleen can kill him, but Meti makes the killing possible.

8. Witness to the father's sacrifice

At Harrisburg, Meti fights beside Hamidi against Cerberus and the demon swarm but is forced away when her father chooses the final confrontation. Her cry of “Father. Please. Stay with me” returns the ancient Re-inc to the emotional truth of a daughter losing her parent.

9. From daughter to mother

Fifteen years later, Meti is married and living in New York. She has a son with the same blue eyes and names him Hamilton. The child is Hamidi reborn, transforming the old father/daughter relationship into mother/son.

Arc Resolution

Meti finishes not as Hamidi's replacement in imitation, but as the natural continuation of the mythology. She has experienced power, bereavement, responsibility and motherhood. A future franchise can therefore centre on her as the experienced Re-inc while Hamilton grows into the memories and abilities of the man who once raised her.

5. Hart Chepere

Hart follows a steadfast negative arc in which the character does not morally change; instead, his method and public identity expand until the monster beneath them becomes visible. He begins as Cerberus's emissary and ends exactly that — but the journey from anonymous outsider to spiritual celebrity makes his corruption socially dangerous rather than merely supernatural.

Hart's power is not that he makes people believe a lie with no evidence. He gives them real miracles, real spectacle and emotionally satisfying explanations, then redirects that trust toward grievance and war.

Starting State

- Hart begins as the human-facing form of Cerberus's emissary, first appearing as Becky before adopting the male identity Hart Chepere.
- He is curious about ordinary human systems but regards rules, institutions and human life as trivial obstacles.
- He possesses genuine supernatural power, allowing him to manufacture proof for the role he intends to play.
- His loyalty is to Cerberus and the larger plan to make humanity turn against itself.

Major Stages of the Arc

1. Arrival through violence

The emissary leaves Harrisburg, murders two rangers and steals a vehicle. The violence establishes that the later preacher persona is performance rather than moral complexity.

2. Learning the machinery of attention

In Las Vegas, Hart manipulates slot machines, cash, computers and media. He quickly learns that modern power can be accumulated through visibility as easily as physical force.

3. The genuine miracle

At the New Covenant Worship Center, Hart heals Angie Schuman. Because the miracle is real, sceptical explanations fail and viral attention becomes earned within the story world.

4. From healer to authority

Talk-show appearances, a book and a television programme allow Hart to move from “man who performed a miracle” to interpreter of world events. He begins framing Jerusalem and the Vatican as evidence of conflict between belief systems.

5. Private contempt, public holiness

His murder of Pope Adrian and destruction of the Vatican reveal his contempt for faith itself. Publicly he praises God; privately he calls the Church empty and worthless. The hypocrisy is strategic, not conflicted.

6. Grievance becomes mobilisation

At the Celestial Ballroom, Hart shifts from reassurance to identity politics: believers are being demeaned, battle lines are being drawn, and vengeance is coming. The crowd accepts escalation because trust has already been built through miracles and celebrity.

7. The Four Riders make rhetoric real

Hart summons the riders and sacred sites across several religions are attacked. His purpose becomes undeniable to the audience: he does not want one faith to triumph; he wants faith turned against faith.

8. The false prophet is unmasked

At Allegiant Stadium, Hart still controls the crowd until Hamidi challenges him publicly. Ordinary bullets fail, mercury is named, and Hart transforms before thousands of witnesses and cameras. The image he built collapses in a single undeniable revelation.

9. Destruction

Meti restrains him and Cathleen fires the mercury ammunition. Hart dies not in secret but on the stage he created for himself. His greatest instrument — mass visibility — becomes the mechanism that proves his deception to the world.

Arc Resolution

Hart is destroyed, but the screenplay deliberately reveals that he was never the final source. His death is a false ending because Cerberus remains at Harrisburg. This distinction gives Hart a complete antagonist arc while preserving Cerberus as the deeper force the heroes must confront.

6. Cerberus

Cerberus is the screenplay's steadfast ancient antagonist. Unlike Hart, he does not need public transformation because he exists outside ordinary society. His dramatic function is to embody the source behind the manipulation: a creature powerful enough to send emissaries, summon riders, maintain informants inside intelligence services and treat human conflict as an instrument rather than an end in itself.

Cerberus does not seek converts. He seeks ownership. Hart manipulates belief so that people divide themselves; Cerberus waits behind that process as the force that expects the resulting world to become his.

Major Stages of the Arc

1. The source at Harrisburg

The opening locates Cerberus inside the Eureka Mine and establishes the blue whirlpool as his threshold. He sends the emissary into the world rather than simply walking into civilisation himself.

2. Remote command

Cerberus remains mostly unseen while Hart operates. His conversation with Hart confirms the hierarchy: Hart requests the Four Riders; Cerberus decides when they will be made ready.

3. The hidden network

Cerberus says he has “received word” that the Angel and his child seek Hart. Noan later proves that the supernatural enemy has penetrated Mossad and international investigation, widening Cerberus from singular monster to networked threat.

4. Hart fails

Hart is exposed and destroyed, but Cerberus remains. The false victory demonstrates that defeating a public manifestation of evil is not the same as confronting its source.

5. The mine confrontation

Hamidi, Cathleen, Meti and Daniel enter the Eureka Mine. Cerberus identifies Hamidi as Angel, rejects the Guardians' demand and unleashes an army of demons. The hidden source finally becomes an active physical antagonist.

6. Drag the monster into daylight

The heroes retreat from the mine as Cerberus follows them out into Harrisburg. This visually reverses the opening: the creature once confined to shadow is drawn into direct confrontation under the desert sky.

7. Captured rather than killed

Hamidi snaps the iron collar around Cerberus's neck. The collar generates a cage and removes him, fulfilling Meti's belief that Cerberus must be "locked with the others." The ancient force is contained, not simplistically erased.

Arc Resolution

Cerberus ends defeated in this conflict but not philosophically transformed. His capture reinforces the trilogy's larger cosmology: some evils are not permanently destroyed by one victory; they are restrained through vigilance, sacrifice and recurring guardianship.

7. Daniel Redbird

Daniel follows an intuitive-witness-to-courageous-participant arc. He begins as the local man who notices something wrong when Becky walks out of the desert. Because authorities dismiss his spiritual instincts and later his physical evidence, his arc is built around trusting perception when official certainty says nothing is there.

Daniel's importance is thematic as well as structural. His Timbisha worldview broadens the screenplay's treatment of faith beyond the religions Hart publicly exploits, and Hamidi's answer — 'I serve everyone' — places the Re-inc mission above sectarian ownership.

Starting State

- Daniel is grounded in Timbisha Village, the tourist centre and the desert landscape around Furnace Creek.
- He is spiritually sensitive enough to feel that something has entered the land before he can prove what it is.
- His concerns are treated dismissively by Ranger Ade Henderson, making institutional disbelief part of his obstacle.

Major Stages of the Arc

1. The impossible walker

Daniel sees Becky approaching Furnace Creek from the direction of Harrisburg in lethal heat without a vehicle. The image stays with him because it contradicts everything he knows about the desert.

2. Murder makes intuition urgent

When the two rangers are killed, Daniel connects the stranger to the crime and repeatedly asks where she could have come from. Ade offers conventional explanations but cannot answer the central geographical problem.

3. Spiritual warning

Daniel asks the Creator to protect the land from what has entered it. The moment frames his concern as responsibility toward place rather than private superstition.

4. Harrisburg investigation

He enters the abandoned mine himself, sees red eyes, hears movement and watches breath form in the darkness. Fear drives him back, but the experience confirms that the threat is physical as well as spiritual.

5. Dismissal strengthens rather than breaks him

Ade mocks his beliefs and treats Harrisburg as dead ground. Daniel cannot prove what he saw, but he refuses to reinterpret the experience simply because authority dislikes the explanation.

6. Recognition by the heroes

At Furnace Creek Inn, Daniel meets Hamidi, Cathleen and Meti and lays out the logical chain from the murdered rangers to Harrisburg. For the first time, people with relevant experience treat his conclusion seriously.

7. From witness to guide

Daniel offers to lead them to the mine. When he asks whether Hamidi serves Appü, Hamidi answers, “I serve everyone.” Daniel accepts the larger mission and enters the darkness alongside him.

8. Participant in the final battle

Daniel witnesses Cerberus directly, survives the demon swarm and reaches Hamidi after the sacrifice. He has moved from a man whose warning is dismissed to a human witness to the event that saves the world.

Arc Resolution

Daniel is vindicated, but the arc is not about proving Ade wrong. It is about trusting the relationship between knowledge, place and intuition strongly enough to act. Without Daniel's persistence, the heroes defeat Hart but may never reach Cerberus.

8. Liya Gebre

Liya has a quieter protective-family arc. She is not structured as a combat protagonist, but her presence gives Hamidi and Meti something the supernatural war repeatedly threatens to deny them: an ordinary family relationship. Her death therefore matters less as plot shock than as the destruction of the domestic future Hamidi briefly regains.

Major Stages of the Arc

1. Reunited family

In Jerusalem, Liya and Hamidi discuss Meti as parents rather than warriors. Their concern about her memories and abilities establishes a shared history and a functioning family unit.

2. Trusting Meti

When danger closes around Jerusalem, Liya follows Meti's lead through the airport. The mother-daughter relationship subtly reverses as the child's supernatural abilities become the means of protection.

3. Refuge with Winston

In Virginia, Liya enters the familiar network around Hamidi. Winston welcomes her through Meti, giving the family a temporary domestic haven while the international crisis grows.

4. Murder by the hidden enemy

Noan and Sam enter the house. After Noan kills Sam, he turns the gun on Liya. Her murder reveals that the demonic network has penetrated the very institutions pursuing the family.

5. Presence through absence

Liya continues to shape the story after death: Hamidi and Meti discuss grief, Winston undertakes to return her home, and the Ethiopian graveyard places her beside Hamidi in the final act of remembrance.

Arc Resolution

Liya's arc ends in death, but the screenplay refuses to make her loss disposable. She becomes the emotional event that matures Meti, exposes the cost of Hamidi's mission and makes the final rebirth imagery feel earned rather than decorative.

9. Noan Barak

Noan follows a concealed-negative arc. He appears to be a Mossad professional assisting Sam Clifford's investigation, but the story gradually reveals that his institutional access is precisely what makes him dangerous. He is not corrupted during the screenplay; his arc is the progressive exposure of an allegiance that was present from the beginning.

Noan demonstrates one of Triumvirate 3's key fears: evil no longer operates only through obvious outsiders. It can occupy the systems built to identify and contain threats.

Major Stages of the Arc

1. Credible ally

At the Western Wall aftermath, Noan appears as a competent Mossad agent sharing information with Sam. His concern over the fatality and his familiarity with the investigation make him trustworthy.

2. The pursuit expands

Noan identifies Liya and Meti and coordinates information between Israel and Sam. His access appears useful because the protagonists are legitimately fugitives from earlier events.

3. Cerberus receives word

Cerberus later knows that the Angel and his child seek Hart. The line quietly establishes a reporting channel without revealing the source.

4. Washington closes the trap

Noan tracks Liya and Meti to Winston's remote home and brings Sam with him. The apparent counter-terror investigation gives the intrusion institutional legitimacy.

5. The mask drops

As Sam moves to arrest Liya, Noan shoots him in the head. The act reveals that Sam was never his true partner; he was useful cover.

6. Meti answers the betrayal

Noan murders Liya and reveals his demon form to Meti. She overpowers and kills him, and his body reverts. The hidden infiltrator is exposed only after inflicting the screenplay's most personal loss.

Arc Resolution

Noan dies, but his dramatic value survives in what he proves: Cerberus has informants inside human authority. Luca Ferretti's separate demonic reveal reinforces the same idea, making institutional infiltration a pattern rather than a one-off twist.

10. Supporting Arc Functions

Winston Burnie

Represents loyalty made practical. He gives Liya and Meti refuge, brings warmth and humour into the darkest section, handles the aftermath of the killings and promises to return Liya home. His bond with Meti also helps bridge the previous film into the next generation.

Sam Clifford

Represents the legitimate human pursuit of the protagonists. He suspects Hamidi and Cathleen because they are repeatedly present at impossible events, not because he is corrupt. His murder by Noan distinguishes mistaken institutional suspicion from genuine demonic infiltration.

Pastor Caleb Drake

Represents sincere faith manipulated by charisma. He helps Hart gain legitimacy because he believes the miracle he witnesses. His presence matters precisely because he is not knowingly evil: Hart's strategy works by exploiting people who genuinely want to believe they are doing good.

Luca Ferretti

Functions as an earlier proof that demonic infiltration has reached international law enforcement. His transformation on the train turns a procedural pursuit into supernatural attack and prepares the audience to understand Noan's later betrayal as part of a wider network.

Pope Adrian VII

Provides a direct spiritual opponent to Hart. His refusal to be impressed by miracles or intimidated by demonic power exposes Hart's vanity and contempt before the public false-prophet persona fully develops.

12. Overall Evaluation

Triumvirate 3 has the most generational character architecture of the trilogy. The first film brought Cathleen into Hamidi's world; the second strengthened Meti as a supernatural presence; the third transfers emotional and narrative responsibility from Hamidi to Meti. The global Holy War plot therefore operates alongside a quieter succession story.

- Hamidi completes a sacrificial arc: steadfast service culminates in the willing loss of his current life.
- Cathleen completes her movement from outsider to family, remaining the human continuity figure after Hamidi is gone.
- Meti moves from protected child to active Re-inc, bereaved daughter, inheritor and mother.
- Hart demonstrates how genuine gifts, spectacle and belonging can be converted into manipulation and grievance.
- Cerberus represents the deeper source that cannot simply be killed; it must be contained through sacrifice.
- Daniel shows the value of intuition and local knowledge when formal authority refuses to look beyond its preferred explanation.
- Liya gives the supernatural conflict an intimate cost, while Noan demonstrates the danger of hidden corruption inside trusted institutions.

The strongest recurring character idea is that power reveals character rather than creating it. Hamidi and Meti use extraordinary ability in service of others; Hart uses it to acquire devotion; Cerberus uses others as instruments; Cathleen and Daniel have no comparable supernatural advantage yet still become essential because they choose to act. The screenplay therefore keeps moral agency above raw power.
